The 9 mile long site was remote, thinly populated and with little infrastructure. In August,10,000 Irish Navvies started arriving, building their own timber houses before starting construction of the biggest factory in the world. Work also started on 2 new Garden Townships to house the 8,000 managers and 12,000, mostly women, workers coming to "stir the Devil's Porridge". Astonishingly, within 12 months, cordite was being produced and in May 1917 the King and Queen came to celebrate production reaching 800 tons a week which was as much as all the other Royal Ordinance Factories combined. HM Factory Gretna transformed our region and the story told by the Devil's Porridge Museum sheds light on an overlooked aspect of the War. The talk will cover the use of cordite, the building of the factory and of Eastriggs and Gretna, the role of women in the production process and the government response to perceived excessive drinking by workers at the factory. Care Day 2023 - Sellafield Centre of Excellence



On November 11th, Sellafield Ltd's Centre of Excellence opened its doors to welcome 45 children in support of Care Day 2023. This is the world's biggest annual celebration of children who have been, or who currently are living in care. Supported by 5 IET West Cumbria representatives, children had the opportunity to engage in a series of group games and one-on-one sessions, tailored to their individual interests and needs.

Children in care have usually experienced

hardship in their lives before coming into care and have often been subjected to various forms of neglect and as a result have difficulty in forming new relationships. However, a caring and safe environment can help to improve the young person's chance of success and can help them to overcome their often-troubling early life experiences. The event this year aimed to foster a sense of curiosity and enthusiasm for the field of engineering, while providing a safe and welcoming environment for the children to explore their potential.

An all-round favourite for this year was the rocket building session lead by Joseph Rossall. Children were guided whilst building their rockets out of card and tape before seeing how far they could be

launched across the carpark outside. It was great to see such a wide range of ages starting to apply concepts such as aerodynamics into their designs, linking a fun activity back to the amazing world of STEM.

The team really enjoyed supporting the day and we are looking forward to supporting the event again next year!
